“We are very grateful for Senator Merkley's and Senator Wyden's ongoing support for ecological fuels reduction and tribal workforce development and training in rural Klamath and Harney Counties,” **said Marko Bey, Lomakatsi Executive Director.** “This funding will allow us to employ 12 inter-tribal young adults (ages 18-30, and veterans up to age 35) in a year-long training program to accomplish strategic forest health and fuels reduction work on Tribal Trust and Forest Service lands in areas at high risk of wildfire, while providing a pathway to natural resource careers through professional certification and hands-on experience.”

“Our community is so grateful that Senators Wyden and Merkley appreciate the importance of addressing acute mental health needs early in a person's life and have made funding for this youth psychiatric facility a federal priority. There are no facilities like this east of the I-5 corridor, so this represents an opportunity to serve families both in Central Oregon and the entire eastern two thirds of the state,” **said Phil Chang, Deschutes County Commissioner.**

The Cinder Hollow project will be significant as it will provide affordable housing opportunities for those who cannot currently access the housing market.
