“This is exciting news and will make such a huge difference in our community for many of our neighbors and residents. We are so thankful to Senator Merkley and Senator Wyden for securing these much-needed funds for our community. These funds will be used to make the critical repairs or modifications needed to keep low and moderate-income families in their homes by replacing leaky roofs, building accessible ramps to the doors, repairing floors with holes in them, etc. Seniors, people with disabilities, and families with young children who own their own home but do not have the necessary resources to make these emergent repairs will now be able to stay in their homes. The city partners with the Yamhill County Affordable Housing Corporation to administer this program. We have over 190 households on a wait list in the City of McMinnville. Since 2014, over 77 homes have been helped thus far with two \$500,000 grants in the past. With these funds we hope to help approximately 75 more households,” **said Mayor Kim Morris, City of McMinnville.**
